President's Letter: December 2012

Travel & Movement, Arrival and Closure



So many of us travel during the holidays, it's easy – for me – to draw correlations between movement over space and movement over time.

AAUW's Mission

AAUW advances equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy, and research.

As my husband and I returned from visiting family over Christmas, we were making rough plans for our activities and trips in 2013. He asked when I'd be finished with my term as president of the Huntsville Branch and I replied that my term ended in June, 2013. He said something to the effect that "then you'll be done with that."

It hit me that he's comparing service to AAUW to that with other boards I've served on in the past. After all, after you're president of an organization's board, you spend a year in relative retirement before rotating off the board. Then you're done. They ask you to remain a member of the organization or ask for financial support now and then, but you're essentially done with the repetitive meetings and many other time and effort commitments that being a non-profit board member requires. You have a responsibility and are accountable to the organization, but that lasts – usually – as long as your term on the board lasts. From then on you transition to being an occasional advocate for the organization.

My response: First, acutely aware that I needed to do a better job of informing him what AAUW does, did, and still has to do to make things better for women and girls, I explained that it's an ongoing effort, backed by many stories, needs, and numbers (statistics that tell what's yet to be done).

"When my term as president is over, I'll do something else within the Branch – whatever is needed and also desired by the new president; something I feel will let me continue to contribute to our mission in a way that uses my talents and abilities. This is more of a lifelong commitment, and I'll support it at whatever levels I can as my life progresses."

AAUW and other organizations and individuals have been working to better the fate of women for a long time. The work will not end any time soon: there will always be factions and individuals who see it to their advantage to oppress women, whether it's to pay them less for equal work, to subjugate them to their will, or to take away rights that make them able to function as equals within a society.

In the words of the season: *"...and miles to go before I sleep."*

So as we travel through our lives, we meet many arrival points, and experience closure on many efforts and levels.

I don't think we will arrive or close on the issues of equity for women and girls because there will always be those to whom advantage comes if disadvantage comes to women. They will never see that

the lot of men only improves when the lot of women improves.

I think it will be more of a journey and less of an arrival, but the points we visit or arrive at as we take the trip will make the journey worthwhile and fulfilling.

I know many of you are on this journey as well, and that you, too, realize that *we have miles to go before we sleep*.

Other notes:

We've had some incredible meetings this year, meetings that I *know* you'd find interesting and valuable. If you missed the December meeting, please read the summary in this newsletter. Our speakers were fabulous and many members came up to me afterwards to tell me that it was a great meeting. Same thing happened in November...

I want to thank those who have stepped up to help Program VP Rose Norman in coordinating programs. Amanda Jarrett and Joy Agee have both done outstanding jobs with their meetings, showing leadership for the Branch. Other members will be helping out in the coming months.

Our visitors from National AAUW were a delight, and we're so grateful to them for coming to Huntsville and sharing with us at our December meeting. Dr. Catherine Hill, Laura Stepp, and Cordy Galligan: thank you for sharing your time, knowledge, and talents with the Branch. You brought us valuable resources and I hope we can continue to learn more about not only the work the national organization does for us, but also the resources they make available to make our lives better and easier.

We have some other excellent programs coming up, so please make plans to attend. With a new venue for March's Breaking Through Barriers luncheon, we'll need everyone's help in filling the room!

Saturday, January 12 Meeting – Heroic Women of Israel/Palestine

Mary Witherspoon



Osie Adelfang and **Mary Witherspoon** will present the January program for the Huntsville Branch. Osie was born an Israeli Jew in Jerusalem; her family emigrated to the US when she was eight. She studied journalism at UMass and received her MFA in creative nonfiction from Antioch University. She has written two books and many articles and essays, and taught college English. She has been an activist for Palestinian human rights for 10 years.

Mary, a longtime member of the Huntsville Branch, is a board member of [Pal Craftaid](#), an organization that supports Palestinian women who are bravely working to help their people and to preserve their culture. She visited the Occupied Palestinian Territories in 2011 and will tell of some of the courageous

women whom she met there.

After Osie's and Mary's presentations there will be time for Q&A. In addition, Mary will have olive wood carvings and Palestinian embroidered scarves, purses, etc., for sale to support Palestinians whose lives are severely impacted by the occupation, such as the YWCAs of Palestine, Rawdat El Zuhur School in East Jerusalem, ATTA (Aid to the Aged), and Atfaluna School for the Deaf in Gaza.

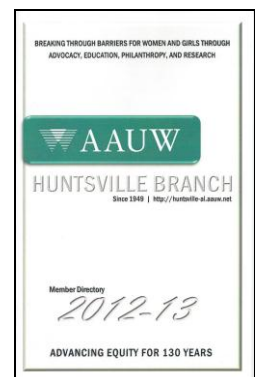

The day started with our guests from AAUW National sharing breakfast with our branch president, followed by a tour of HudsonAlpha Institute for Biotechnology. After the tour our guests from AAUW National and branch members and their guests enjoyed lunch at the Eaves.

The evening program opened with an exhibit from local organizations that promote girls and women in science, such as Girls, Inc., Seed to Plate, and Project Lead the Way. This gave our members an

Kenya Wallace delivered a moving Reflection about what it means to be a woman of color in a STEM field.



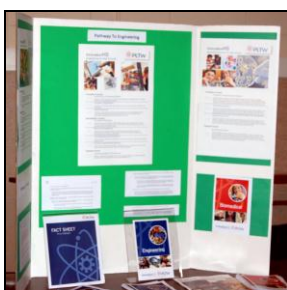

2013 Must Read List –Read It and Weep, then Act!

My holiday reading includes two items released this year by AAUW—both sad reminders that we have not come far enough to realize pay equity—I prefer “equality” – for women in this country.

I recommend to you ***The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap***, a 28-page paper posing and answering six questions commonly asked about this subject. Called a “commonsense guide,” the report includes sections which range from defining the term to showing us members how we can effect change. You will find state-by-state rankings; latest statistics on the pay gap by age, race/ethnicity and education; and resources for fair pay advocates.

The second, and longer (64 pages), document bears the unhappy title, ***Graduating to a Pay Gap—the Earnings of Women and Men One Year after College Graduation***. In this project, the researchers narrowed their focus and found that women in their first year out of college working full time earned, on the average, 82 percent of what their male counterparts did. Filled with more evidence and statistics, this report is also dismaying, especially for those of us who know women who are now or will soon be experiencing this discrimination.

In her introductory remarks to *The Simple Truth*, **Linda D. Hallman, AAUW Executive Director**, writes: “If you take one simple truth from this guide, I hope it’s this: The pay gap is real. This guide backs up this assertion with the latest evidence and presents new ideas for what we can do about it.”

Please read these studies soon and work to help launch an effort to get Montgomery and Washington to move. The Paycheck Fairness Act failed—again—in the US Senate for lack of 8 votes. Laura Hall has tried more than once to get an Equal Pay Commission established without success. I look forward to our Huntsville Branch putting this information and these tools to good use, individually and collectively!

Please mark your calendars for the **2013 AAUW of Alabama business meeting at Judson College in Marion**. The tentative date is **March 30**. The state business meeting is shorter, smaller, and more relaxed than our state convention, which is held in even-numbered years. The next state convention will be held in Huntsville in 2014.

Judson is the nation's fifth oldest women's college (1838), named for **Ann Hasseltine Judson**, America's first female foreign missionary. Marion is located in west central Alabama, a short drive from Tuscaloosa, Montgomery, and Birmingham (roughly 170 miles and 3 to 3½ hours from Huntsville). Marion (population 4,000+) is home to antique stores, beautiful antebellum homes, and great southern cuisine.

The **Alabama Women's Hall of Fame**, established to provide a permanent place of honor for Alabama's most outstanding women, is located on the Judson campus, and you will have a chance to tour it. **Dr. Frances Roberts** will have been inducted in early March. **Hallie Farmer**, former president of AAUW of Alabama, was one of the first three inductees, including **Helen Keller** and **Julia Tutwiler**, in 1971.

We'll share details about the business meeting in the February newsletter. The state executive committee will meet Friday night (the 29th), and workshops for Student Advisory Council members will be held that afternoon and evening. The Board of Directors will meet Saturday morning at 8 am. The state business meeting will be held later Saturday afternoon.

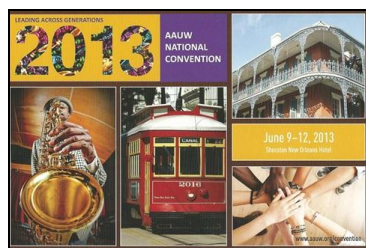
