Our branch was fortunate to have a two-day visit with **Lisa Maatz** this month thanks to Devon Reynolds. Lisa met with state leaders, had tours of **Hudson Alpha** and the **Space and Rocket Center**, lunch at UAH, dinner at Commerce Kitchen, and lots of small meetings with various members. I know that there are several exciting plans in the works for next year as well as the State Convention in Huntsville next April.

Her program for us was very informational. She explained the differences between Senate and House cultures and operations. She talked about how important it was to work on the executive branch for implementation of laws. That is the main battlefield today, because there is organized strategy to obstruct implementation of passed legislation that the minority group doesn't like. She explained the "nuclear option" and what it may mean for the future.

She told of being an 8 year old in a crumbling school in Ohio where there were no privacy doors in the girls' restroom. She talked to the principal, got nowhere, and then decided to start a petition. She was successful – not just because of her petition (complete with hearts and Hello Kitty stickers) – but because when the principal talked to his secretary and her mother, they both told him he better get those doors. She learned the power of having a group behind you and persevering to get action.

One of the big takeaways was learning that AAUW members in DC, Virginia, and Maryland lobby on our behalf every Thursday. Lisa said that NO other organization has this kind of presence. This group can visit 70-80 congressional offices each week. They visit both parties and are welcomed in most offices. After hearing Lisa speak, the whole room signed up for <u>AAUW Action Alert/Two Minute Activist</u>. We were encouraged to involve prospective members and friends in this also by forwarding these emails.



Lisa gave us her time when she planned to take a day off for her December 2 birthday. We signed a card for her and enjoyed a wonderful chocolate birthday cake provided by "What's for Dinner." Rose Norman led us in singing Happy Birthday. We also enjoyed two holiday carols sung acapella by **Kenisha Hill-Phillips**. **Dana Gideon** did another lovely job of providing table decorations. In addition, **Mary Witherspoon and husband Newell** brought and displayed items from the **Pal CraftAid Inc**. Sales of these handcrafted items support Palestinians whose lives are severely impacted by the occupation, such as the YWCAs of Palestine, Rawdat El Zuhur School in East Jerusalem, ATTA (Aid to the Aged), and Atfaluna School for the Deaf in Gaza.

Hilary Clinton Announces New Project

Recently, **Hilary Clinton** went before a large audience—the more than 7,000 who had gathered in Philadelphia for the 10th annual Pennsylvania Conference on Women—and added clarity as to what she intends to do about empowering women across the planet.

She is launching a project through the newly renamed <u>Bill, Hillary and Chelsea Clinton Foundation</u> that is modeled on the work her husband, the former president, has done through the global initiative. It seeks to harness and direct private resources toward measuring the progress, or lack of it, that women have made, and to "bring abuses out of the shadows and raise global consciousness."

It also now has an official name: "No Ceilings: The Full Participation Project."

iAdelante! Book of the Month Club

iAdelante! Book of the Month Club will meet at the Huntsville Madison County Main Library, Meeting Room D (upstairs) on Thursday, December 19, at 5:45 p.m. We'll be reviewing the December selection, *A Thousand Splendid Suns*, by Khaled Hosseini **Robson**. Born a generation apart and with very different ideas about love and family, Mariam and Laila are two women brought jarringly together by war, by loss, and by fate. As they endure the escalating dangers around them — in their home as well as in the streets

of Kabul — they come to form a bond that makes them both sisters and mother-daughter to each other, and that will ultimately alter the course not just of their own lives but of the next generation. A stunning accomplishment, *A Thousand Splendid Suns* is a haunting, heartbreaking, compelling story of an unforgiving time, an unlikely friendship, and an indestructible love.

iAdelante! Book Review

Ride the Wind: The Story of Cynthia Ann Parker and the Last Days of the Comanche by Lucia St. Clair Robson.

The book is based on a true story. Cynthia Ann Parker was abducted from her family in 1836 at age 9, adopted by the Comanche, and lived for 24 years among them forgetting her white ways. She married an Indian Chief of the Noconi tribe. She was the mother of three, among them Quanah Parker, who was the last free Comanche War Chief. She was "rescued" but never was integrated back into the society of her blood relatives.

This book gives a balanced view of the Indians and their culture. It was interesting to learn of their survival on the Plains. Although popular history creates the notion that the pioneers were in constant danger of extermination by the Indians, in early Texas history that was not always the case. Pioneers were annoyed by Indian raids. The Indians valued the American settlers' horses as they were superior to the Spanish stock. In 1822, there were only 45,000 Indians in the area from the Rio Grande to the Red River and of these only 30,000 were Comanche. They roamed as far as the Missouri River and only a part of the total population was in Texas at any one time. Therefore, there was only about one Indian for every 67 settlers.

After the Texas revolution and with the increasing encroachment of white settlers, the Comanche, realizing that their way of life was threatened, became more hostile. This was the time period outlined

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in the book.

Personally, this book was very interesting. Prior to 1836, my forefather David Burkett got land grants from the Mexican government. His first grant was listed in November of 1831 and the largest grant in May of 1832. As I read the book, I imagined David, his family of six and their life in Gonzales, Texas. A historical marker to David Burkett can be found on FM 146 near East City Limits at Kerr Creek, Gonzales, Texas which reads "**David Burkett** - Progressive patriot and citizen soldier in Texas war for independence. A member of Green Dewitt's Colony. Came to Texas with his family, 1830. Served as a guard for women and children fleeing Gonzales before the approach of Santa Anna, 1836. Is buried on his 4,428-acre land grant extending south from this site."

Please consider joining us. I would not have read this book or even known about it if I had not been a part of iAdelante!.

If we are lucky, Lisa will also be attending the state convention here in Huntsville, April 4-6, at the Marriott, as may Lilly Ledbetter. Lisa is passionate about social justice, funny and down to earth, and I think those of us who attended the December dinner meeting and heard her talk about Congress got a fresh perspective on how government works. It was her first trip to Alabama, she had a good time, and we are all grateful to her.

For those of you who have not read the 2013-15 Public Policy Program, which was updated during the June 2013 national convention in New Orleans, I suggest you find it on line and read it (<u>http://www.aauw.org/resource/public-policy-program-brochure/</u>). I have thought since I first read it that it is one of the best statements of social justice I have ever seen. Broadly, it supports "a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness, equity, and diversity"; aims "to achieve economic self-sufficiency for all women"; and seeks to guarantee equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse society." Members can make suggestions for change, and members—present at the convention or not—can vote on the proposed changes.

Arise just sent out a letter warning members that it's rumored (and I've also heard it through a state legislator) that the state legislature is going to try to hold an intense, shortened legislative session with three-day weeks; they want no controversy; and they're going to try to finish early so they can start campaigning for the June elections. It certainly sounds like another year of their pushing bills through. In light of this, we're going to have to keep up the pressure to fight bad bills (of which I am sure there will be many) and to push to get bills like pay equity through. Remember that Lilly Ledbetter is with us in fighting for pay equity, and the legislature DOESN'T WANT CONTROVERSY. On this and our other issues, we've got to make our voices heard. AAUW of Alabama will be looking into setting up a state notification of pending legislation, much like the national Two-Minute Activist.

In this season of giving, you may want to consider contributing to AAUW for its many innovative programs. I want to suggest particularly that you consider contributing to the Tech Trek program that will be held at UAHuntsville in the summer. Because so many gifts marketed to girls promote stereotyped, objectified images, national AAUW also has a holiday gift guide for girls


