April Meeting – Do You Need a Living Will?

Do you need a living will? The short answer is yes, and it's not just for the elderly! Branch member attorney Anna Blair (known as "Blair") will explain the importance of having advanced directives like living wills and durable powers of attorney for health care, and explain some of the court decisions that led to laws that now allow family members (not just healthcare workers) to make end-of-life decisions for us. But that's only if you have taken the steps to make it possible to allow people you choose to make end-of-life decisions for you when you are no longer able to.

That was the case with <u>Karen Ann Quinlan</u>, the 21-year old who lapsed into a vegetative state after a combination of drugs and alcohol at a party in 1976. Her father had to take the case to the New Jersey Supreme Court to get the right

to stop the ventilator that was keeping her alive and allow her to die a natural death (she lived until 1985). As a result of that case, we now have laws allowing us to appoint a health care proxy. A similar case led to legislation that allows us to execute a binding living will giving instructions to family and health care providers about how much care we want as we approach the end of life.

In addition to Blair's informative presentation, we will be voting on new officers. Watch for a separate email notice that will announce the slate of officers for 2013-2014.

Breaking Through Barriers Luncheon Inspires

Thank you all so much for the support you gave to the 2013 Breaking Through Barriers Luncheon that was held on Friday, March 1, at the Valley Hill Country Club. I heard many compliments about that location. There were over **130 attendees**. So many of you came – some bringing guests. Some of you sent information about the event to others and to other organizations, so we had those that called or emailed me about attending. We had a number of people who were hearing about AAUW for the first time.

We also thank Dr. Deborah Barnhart, CEO and Executive Director of the U. S. Space and Rocket Center, who gave a very informational and inspirational talk about the history of rocketry in the area, as well as the history of the U.S. Space and Rocket Center. She also explained how important science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) education is to women and girls. According to a 2011 White House study, women in STEM fields earned 33% more than women in other fields, and there is more parity between men and women's wages. As of 2009, only 24% of jobs in STEM fields are held by women.

According to Dr. Barnhart, by 2018, in Alabama alone, there will be 97,000 new and replacement jobs in high-tech industries.

Dr. Barnhart has a vision for the future in which the U.S. Space and Rocket Center and it's Space Camp have major roles, and her vision includes space travel to Mars. Why? Her answer came in the form of a quote from **President John F. Kennedy**, who said,

"We choose to go to the moon. We choose to go to the moon in this decade and do the other things, not because they are easy, but because they are hard, because that goal will serve to organize and measure the best of our energies and skills, because that challenge is one that we are willing to accept, one we are unwilling to postpone, and one which we intend to win, and the others, too."

In other words, we need to challenge our students. They must have a problem to solve. How to get to Mars is a problem which will require all the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematical skills they can muster. We must engage them in solving this problem.

And she hopes to engage us all, too, with the diverse programs and offerings that are available at the Space and Rocket Center. Her enthusiasm is contagious. After hearing her speak, we are all ready to get involved with the programs being offered, if not help develop new ones.

The Breaking Through Barriers event requires the help of many to make it a success. Amanda Jarrett and I served as the event co-chairs, with help from Ruth Jurenko and Cindi Branham, previous chairs of this event. Patricia Smith publicized the event at many locations. Cindi, with some input from Rose Norman, worked up the AAUW slides that were shown at the beginning and end of the event. Kay Eastin was in charge of the table decorations and Cindi, Heather Howell, and Sarah Ragan helped put them on the tables. Anna Blair, Marilyn Robertson, and Patti Steelman handled the registration table. Sherry Anderson made sure that there were membership applications and information about the April 2 program. Belk tickets were sold by Peggy East. Joy Agee gave us an inspiring reflection. If I have failed to mention anyone who assisted in any way, please know that your efforts did not go unnoticed or unappreciated.

Profits from this event will be used to send college women student leaders to the AAUW <u>National</u> <u>Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL)</u>, held in early June in the Washington, DC area. The cost is about \$800 per student. The unaudited results are a profit of about \$2800. This will allow us to send a student from Alabama A&M University, Oakwood University, and UAHuntsville to this event. If we can raise about \$400 more, we can add a student from Drake Technical College. We will also be using the funds collected from the Belk sale for this, which may be enough. But **we will continue to accept donations** to ensure that we have enough. **Please send the money to Peggy East or bring it to the April meeting.** Checks should be made out to **AAUW Funds** and note that it will be for **NCCWSL**.

Yes They Can!

And thankfully they DID! In a show of bipartisan force, Republicans recently joined Democrats in the US Congress to reauthorize and strengthen the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA). Notably for us, Senator Richard Shelby, voted not only to consider the bill but also joined 22 other Republican Senators to pass it 77-28. In the House, Representatives Terri Sewell and Spencer Bachus helped push the Senate version (S. 47) of the VAWA to its 286-138 victory there.

Last April, the Senate voted to reauthorize and strengthen the VAWA, authored in then-Senator Joe Biden's office and signed into law by President Bill Clinton in 1994. The bill had been reauthorized previously in 2000 and 2005. Among the additions to last year's Senate version were inclusive measures to bring protections to same-sex partners, American Indians living in reservations, and undocumented immigrants. Without considering the Senate bill, the House then designed and passed its own version, omitting these provisions. For "procedural reasons," the two bills were not reconciled and 2012 ended without the reauthorization of the VAWA.

At the signing ceremony on March 7, President Obama said that this year's victory for the bill "shows that when the American people make their voices heard, Washington listens." Then he joined Vice President Biden in thanking "<u>all</u> the members of Congress from both parties who came together, got this bill across the finish line." (Emphasis added.) Personal thank-you notes to Senator Shelby, Congresswoman Sewell and Congressman Bachus are in order, along with a letter of disappointment to Congressman Brooks for his lack of support. The people, including all of you who made calls or wrote letters or e-mails, recognized and reminded their lawmakers that domestic violence is a public health issue and a human rights concern. Congress heard and acted to reauthorize and strengthen the VAWA. Our work as advocates continues as Mr. Obama reminded us in his closing remarks at the signing, "It's about our commitment as a country to address this problem...as long as it takes."

A lot of good things are going on in Women's History Month,.

The Violence Against Women Reauthorization Act became law and much of the <u>Campus Sexual</u> <u>Violence Elimination Act</u> was included in it. The VAWA reauthorization takes major strides toward ending domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence, and stalking against women and men.

March 8 was International Women's Day, and, on a similar note, more more than 6,000 representatives from government, nongovernmental organizations (NGOs), and civil society are gathering March 4-14 in New York for the <u>57th Commission on the Status of Women (CSW)</u>, part of the UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC). The CSW is the principal global policymaking body dedicated exclusively to gender equality and advancement of women. This year's priority theme is elimination and prevention of all forms of violence against women and girls. AAUW held a panel discussion based on our 2011 research report, <u>Crossing the Line: Sexual Harassment at School</u>.

Did you see PBS' new documentary *MAKERS: Women Who Make America,* which premiered February 26? The documentary and website (<u>www.makers.com</u>) tell the story of the women's movement through firsthand accounts of leaders, opponents, and trailblazers "who created a new America in the last half-century. Four are former AAUW fellows—Jane Chen, Carol Gilligan (author of the seminal *In a Different Voice: Psychological Theory and Women's Development*), Barbara Smith, and Melissa Harris-Perry. Six <u>National Conference for College Women Student Leaders</u> (NCCWSL) Women of Distinction are also featured.

In Washington, March 1-14, the Marching for Women's Rights Exhibit is being held at the Newseum, sponsored by AAUW. On March 3, 1913, the eve of President Woodrow Wilson's first inauguration, 5,000 suffragists, led by lawyer Inez Milholland riding a white horse, marched down Pennsylvania Avenue demanding the right to vote. Many were hospitalized from injuries while police looked on.

AAUW, the Clinton Global Initiative, and the Clinton Global Initiative University have formed a strategic partnership to engage the next generation of leaders. From April 5 to 7, President Clinton will host the sixth annual meeting of CGI U at Washington University in St. Louis where student leaders, including those from the AAUW community, NGO representatives, topic experts, and celebrities will gather to address global challenges with practical solutions.
