May Meeting Summary – Women and ADHD: All Grown Up

Thanks goes to **Dr. Natalie Frazier**, Licensed Professional Counselor at Comprehensive Counseling, LLC, her private practice here in Huntsville, who gave Branch members plenty to consider regarding Women and ADHD at May's monthly meeting.

Individuals with ADHD have different needs and challenges, depending on their gender, age and environment. The lack of appropriate identification and treatment of ADHD in women is a significant public health concern.

Significant concerns and co-existing conditions in women with ADHD include

compulsive overeating, depression, anxiety, alcohol abuse, and chronic sleep deprivation. Leaving ADHD untreated may lead to increased chances of divorce, financial stress, academic difficulties, underemployment, low self-esteem and job stress. Without support, these women often struggle to keep up with the demands of managing their lives, leaving them exhausted and overwhelmed in their pursuit of meeting societal demands.

It is important that women with ADHD receive an accurate diagnosis and treatment. Treatment for ADHD should address symptoms, consider gender, and attend to issues with daily functioning.

Dr. Frazier, past board member and president of the Mental Health Association of Madison County, currently serves on the Executive Board of the American Psychotherapy Association and the Editorial Board for the Annals of Psychotherapy. Prior to private practice, Dr. Frazier worked in a variety of educational roles: general, special, and gifted teacher; school counselor; school psychometrist, gifted program coordinator; and Associate Professor in Psychology, Counseling, and Special Education.



Kenya Wallace's Reflection posed this question: Why are people in the dark about women living with ADHD? According to Dr. Patricia Quinn, a developmental pediatrician and co-founder and director of the National Center for Girls and Women with ADHD, "Women are very good at compensating, coping, staying up late and working very hard. They really suffer silently." By simplifying life, seeking structure and support from family and friends, developing healthy self-care habits, identifying sources of daily stress, building a support group and, most importantly, *focusing on the things they truly enjoy and love*, women living with ADHD can take back control over their lives and celebrate all of the things in life that matter most.

Kay Eastin was awarded the 2013 Eve Award, given to a non-board member each year. Kay's efforts to make our meeting place nicer, more presentable, and welcoming - even when she wasn't able to attend meetings - did so much to lift our image and our mood. Kay is always the consummate welcomer, making new and old members and guests always feel at home when they visited. Carol Roach presented the apple necklace to Kay in 2012 winner Evelyn Sabino's absence.

Thanks to all of you who have supported our spring fund-raising efforts. The money is going to send local college women to attend National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL). You came through with flying colors for the **Breaking through Barriers** luncheon at the Valley Hills Country Club. Including donations, we had a profit of about \$2800. We also sold \$370 in tickets for the Spring Belk Charity Sale. We owe a big thank you to our Belk volunteers, Mary Witherspoon and Carol Roach! Because of their work volunteering at Belk the day before the sale, we earned an extra \$140, for a total of \$510 for the event.

Because of our fundraising efforts, we will be sending four students to NCCWSL. We are funding one student each from UAHuntsville, Oakwood University, Alabama A&M, and Drake State Technical College. This is the first year we've funded a student from Drake. Our AAUW branch is able to contribute about \$800 to each school to cover the expenses the students have.


June: Out on the Sound by R.E. Bradshaw



Twenty women attended the **North Alabama Women's Summit on Government Leadership** held in Huntsville on Saturday, May 18 at the Hampton Cove Golf Clubhouse. **Audrey Salgado** presented, and University of Alabama PhD candidate **Laura Sojko** shared her research on campaign finance and women candidates.

- Mobilization statewide to carry out the mission of The 2014 Project Alabama in locations where
 opportunities for women to run are greatest.
- Launch of a large-scale public education campaign to raise awareness about the lack of women in elected office and the unique opportunities of the 2014 election.

Anyone interested in seeing more women run and be elected to public office, whether you consider yourself a candidate or an advocate/supporter or campaign volunteer, is encouraged to become involved in the effort.
